Comment: I strongly object to the proposed development based on it's height, over-density, lack of affordable housing, lack of required family homes and the increased strain on local infrastructure.

This development does not provide a sufficient level of affordable housing. While I do obviously support the homeless shelter aspect of the development, the need for affordable housing is absolutely essential and this proposal should clearly incorporate a much higher proportion.

Victoria Square has already set a new precedent in relation to the height of buildings in Woking that has changed the surrounding landscape forever. These skyscrapers can be seen from miles away and dominate the skyline in a negative way. This proposal will create an even larger concrete mess.

Finally the increased size and density will result in a larger strain placed on local medical practices

and schools which are already oversubscribed and roads that are impossible to use at peak times. Also the prolonged construction will affect local residents and commuters for an even longer amount of time than we have already had to endure.
